Ofsted report There are concerns regarding safeguarding	The report considers that some of the safeguarding systems ineffective In particular:	
	Not all staff could confidently demonstrate that they understood safeguarding procedures. During the inspection two could not articulate the exact procedures as required by the inspector.	Teaching and non teaching staff have all had the statutory training on safeguarding. Since the inspection both teaching and non teaching have had additional training. This will continue with frequent training updates (6 times a year) on all issues Safeguarding related to create a stronger culture.
	Some teachers do not take registers at the start of the lesson. All statutory registers were completed. However, 7 out of 65 lesson-by-lesson registers inclusive of Sixth form were not completed in the spot check carried by Ofsted.	We accept that this is not good enough. Our new policy ensures that if a register is not taken within 10 minutes of the lesson starting then a teacher receives a reminder via a 'pop-up' message of their screen. If, after a further 2 minutes the register is not taken then a red card, instructing them to take their register is taken to their classroom and presented to them.
	The safeguarding team is currently lacking clear leadership	The leadership of the safeguarding team has been restructured and capacity has been increased in the school. Stowe Valley MAT has commissioned two independent advisors; one from WCC, the other from an Outstanding school within Coventry and Warwickshire to undertake Safeguarding audits within Bilton since the inspection. The conclusion reached by both advisors was that students and staff are safe at Bilton school.
The report considers that the quality of education in some lessons is variable.	During the inspection five subjects were focussed on through their Deep Dive strategy. Inspectors considered that there needed to be greater consistency of the implementation of the curriculum.	The school, with the support of the SVMAT and other external providers is carrying out a number of departmental reviews to reduce the variability of educational experience in lessons. The school has an ongoing cycle of review for all curriculum areas; we recognise that areas are at different developmental stages. The breadth of variance will be eradicated by Dec 2019.
