1. Know what you are facing

Download copies of the exam papers you will be sitting. You can find these on the website of your specific examination board. Search for English Language GCSE Past papers. There are several websites where you can also find past papers for English such as:

2. Create a reminder paper

Use a blank copy of each question paper to create your own revision guide to that paper. Rather than answering the question log under each question your key reminders, method, timing and any key vocabulary you think you may need. You could also add in a model paragraph from your notes or classes. This gives you a quick go to resource to keep all the key information together.

3. Be sure of your skills

In English Language you are showing your skills in reading for meaning, analysis, comparison and critical evaluation as well as writing for different purposes and audiences. Be sure you know where you will apply those skills.

Assessment Objective	What does it mean for me?	Where is it tested?
AO1	Select and retrieve information; comprehension skill; inferential reading.	
AO2	Knowledge about language and structure; ability to analyse these for the effects.	
AO3	Comparing texts in terms of what I understand and how the writer presents the text.	
AO4	Evaluating the text in terms of what we can infer from it and how the writer has created that impression and its effect.	
AO5	The content and organisation of my writing: structure, vocabulary; features, register and purpose.	
AO6	The technical accuracy of my writing: punctuation, spelling, grammar and sentence structure.

4. Practice key questions

Practice the questions you are least confident with. First, aim to get the method right using your notes from class. Then work on your timing. If you have missed some lessons, don't worry.
